



Cabernet Noir

General:	The vine "Cabernet Noir" was bred in 1991 by the Swiss vine breeder Valentin Blattner. It is a cross between Cabernet Sauvignon and resistance partners.		
Grape:	The grape is short, loose-with small shoulders.		
Berry:	The berry is round, small and covered with a uniform layer of wax. The berry skin is like Cabernet Sauvignon, very firm and therefore very resistant to botrytis.		
Maturity:	The maturity date is very early, in Germany late August and early September, and thus well suited for more <u>northern wine regions</u> .		
Growth:	The growth is moderate and upright. Due to the short Internodes are uniform all the grapes in a horizon of what the eventual defoliation of the work much easier		
Resistance skills:	Good resistance to powdery mildew, downy mildew and botrytis. Very good resistance in winter frosts.		
Taste:	The wine has a subtle Cabernet aroma, reminiscent of Cabernet Franc from. The ripe tannins round out the nice soft flavor profile of this variety.		
Currently:	In November 2011, a name for this species at the European Plant Variety Office CPVO applied for, it is expected spring 2012 will have a name.
